Our objective is to ensure that all pupils eligible are supported to achieve their full potential academically, socially and emotionally. We aim to ensure that these pupils make at least expected progress, develop strong self-esteem and confidence, and are equipped with the skills, resilience and aspirations needed for future success. We also recognise that regular attendance is fundamental to pupil progress and wellbeing, and aim to improve attendance rates for all targeted pupils, reducing the gap between them and their peers.

We work towards these objectives through a targeted and responsive approach. We provide tailored academic and social, emotional and mental health support based on individual pupil needs through our ALP offer. Early intervention is a central feature of our approach. In addition, we ensure that all pupils have access to a broad range of enriching experiences, including educational visits, forest schools, creative activities including music, art and role play, and physical development through structured play and movement sessions. Targeted strategies are also in place to support and improve attendance, working closely with families to remove barriers and promote positive engagement with school.

We work closely with parents and carers to provide access to a wide range of support services. Strong partnerships with external agencies and charities enable us to support families effectively, including addressing factors that may impact on attendance and engagement.

The key principles underpinning our strategy are equity, early intervention, and personalised support. We prioritise high-quality teaching and targeted intervention to address specific barriers to learning, ensuring that support is monitored for impact. Provision is flexible and responsive, allowing us to adapt to the evolving needs of pupils and families. Improving attendance and engagement remains a key priority in ensuring equitable outcomes for all learners.
